Books by evangelical scholars on messianism in the Old Testament are either outdated, too brief, or lack balance, observes the author. The author believes that a correct understanding of messianism in the Old Testament requires a balanced hermeneutical approach - from exegeting the relevant texts and studying their historical context to interpreting prophecy and organizing its theological truths. In the words of the author, To omit one [element] is to do injustice to the Old Testament. Van Groningen has included an extensive bibliography of both books and articles for those wishing to pursue additional study. A Scripture index helps one to locate the author's exegetical insights on various passages. An index of persons concludes the work. In this third book of the Elvenbane series, the elvenlord Kyrtian resumes his father's search for the magical doorway through which the original elvenlords entered the world. The leading biographer of his era, Andre Maurois was also a writer of fiction, an historian, essayist, chronicler, moralist, critic, and man of letters extraordinaire. Much of this study derives from Kolbert's personal relationship with Maurois and Maurois's family and closest literary associates as well as from his private archives. They also examine, for the first time, the significance of Jolivet's involvement with the visual arts and his activities as conductor, teacher and critic. A chronology of Jolivet's life and works with details of first performances provides valuable overview and reference. This fascinating and comprehensive volume is an indispensable source for research into French music and culture of the twentieth century.

The book provides a new perspective on Gide's work, a reconstruction of the moral and intellectual climate in Europe at the beginning of the twentieth century, and a substantial contribution to the cultural history of homosexuality. This wide-ranging and entertaining book explores blank space from incunabula to Google books. Blanks are a paradox--simultaneously nothing and something, gesturing to what was once there or might be there.
